Several members of TOWN attended the following field trip...

"Travis Audubon Society conducted a field trip to the Balcones Canyonlands NWR and the Jonestown Chimney Swift roost on Saturday, September 9, 2006.

15 birders observed 16 species of birds (details below), two
Texas Greater Earless Lizards and two Texas Spotted
Whiptail Lizards, a Red-striped Ribbon Snake, Monarch
and Pipevine Swallowtail Butterflies, several Black
Saddlebags Dragonfly and one Blue-ringed Dancer
Damselfly, one White-tailed Deer, and numerous plant
species in two hours on a warm and humid afternoon on the
beautiful Penn tract of the Balcones Canyonlands
National Wildlife Refuge

(http://www.fws.gov/southwest/refuges/texas/balcones/).
Although most of us did some unplanned exploring on the way back, we all safely returned to our cars and proceeded to the True Grits restaurant in Jonestown where an additional 11 people joined us for dinner. When dusk arrived, we walked across FM 1431 and an additional five people joined us to watch the Chimney Swifts enter their roost. On 9/15/2006, the following trip reported was submitted to the Driftwood Wildlife Association (http://www.chimneyswifts.org/):

The Chimney Swift roost is an abandoned cement cistern in Jonestown, Texas directly across FM 1431 from the True Grits restaurant.

Number of swifts counted = approximately 1,990
The first five or so entered the cistern at 8:00 PM CDT.
All but about ten were inside by 8:10 PM CDT.
