Bastrop State Park Recovers

Park nearly entirely open

BASTROP STATE PARK, Texas (KXAN) - After the devastating wildfires charred so much of the Bastrop State Park, the predominant color was black, the outlook bleak.

Now, seven months later the park is almost entirely reopened. Campsites and cabins are available, so is the canoe and hiking trails.

Ninety-five percent of the park's 6,000 acres suffered some burns, but most trees were spared.

"This has been a long time coming," said park superintendent Roger Dolle, "hard

work for our staff and volunteers and this is the last hurdle to leap over. We want to get the public in here and get things back to normal."

A few primitive paths in the eastern part of the park re-

main closed, but otherwise everything is good to go. The forest is thinned out a bit, they don't know exactly how many trees they lost.

The restoration was made possible by \$1.4 million in

Hiking in Walnut Creek Metropolitan Park

Four of us (Gloria, VickiZ, NancyL, and Jacque) met at the almost congested Walnut Creek Metropolitan Park for hiking (2 hours) and checking out nature on Easter Sunday. The weather was divine. The park was quite crowded with bikers, hikers, families and dogs. The laughter and voices were sufficient evidence that folks were certainly enjoying themselves.

We investigated/identified a variety of plants (sensitive briar, ground plum, prickly pear cactus, firewheel, wild verbena, bluebonnets, Indian blankets, and thistle) and butterflies (red admiral, tawny emperor, and varieties of sulphurs). Plus we had one plant we were unable to id.

What really got our attention was the invasion of bastard cabbage, the mustard related weed that is driving out wild flowers throughout Central Texas. The weed is originally from North Africa and Central Europe. In fact, leaves from bastard cabbage are actually eaten by people in those regions, usually boiled or fried, but sometimes raw in salads. That, however, does not negate the damage it is doing to our wild flowers.

We crossed several flowing streams and decided the park looks very healthy following the rainfall in February and March. We enjoyed the conversation and companionship. Thanks for joining me.

Chaetura Canyon (Apr 15)

Twelve TOWNies (AmeliaG, CarrieL, MichelleA, SusieA, JenL, BirdieW, MarshaK, GailC, JoanC, LorettaD, DeborahS and GloriaB) were greeted by chimney swifts flying and chattering upon our arrival air at Chaetura Canyon at 8am Sunday morning. We walked into the preserve, we were greeted by our wonderful hosts, Georgean and Paul Kyle, stewards at Chaetura Canyon.

We have a great breakfast of breakfast tacos, a blueberry & peaches dish, tea, coffee and juice. After breakfast, Paul told us the story of Chaetura Canyon, named after the chimney swift (Chaetura pelagica). They had to borrow for part of the down payment of \$75 in 1969. They began by purchasing a single lot and began to build their house. And when they said they built their home, they REALLY BUILT their home! Over the years, they were able to purchase the lots around them (total of 8 acres) to set aside for birds, plants and the wildlife. In the past, they have banded birds (over 15 years), and Georgean single-handedly (pun-intended) fed and rehabilitated over 2000 baby birds. They decided to concentrate on chimney swifts, where very little was known at the time. They have constructed over 12 swift towers on the property and hold chimney swift tower workshops every spring. They have also published a couple of books about building towers and their research on the chimney swifts.

The Kyles have fenced the property to keep deer out of some of the area to allow the native plants to thrive. They also built the great trail that we took that led into the canyon, where we saw part of the creek. We had the pleasure to see the sanctuary after the great mild and wet winter we had. The wildflowers and plants were beautiful!

In 2008, the Kyles legally transferred ownership of the sanctuary to Travis Audubon Society, but they will remain as stewards. The sanctuary is open to the public by invitation only via Travis Audubon.

The Kyles also own a wonderful toy store: Rootin' Ridge Toysmakers (www.rootinridge.com). Marsha said that even a 3-year old cannot break their toys!

After our 2-hour hike into the canyon, we were treated by a wonderful lunch of pasta salad, bread, and strawberries and brownies for dessert. Some of us left Chaetura Canyon with plants, bird houses, bee houses, full stomachs, and most of all, memories and photos of a beautiful area of Central Texas that will never be developed, thanks to the Kyles. 


